Dear _____

I am writing in the capacity of member/guest/employee/concerned citizen regarding Travis Marina. Travis Marina is located on Horseshoe Cove at the southern tip of Sausalito adjacent to the north tower of the Golden Gate Bridge and the Discovery Museum.

Travis Marina, which is the home of the Presidio Yacht Club, is a small pleasure craft marina operated by the US Air Force on land leased from the National Park Service. We have been at this location since 1959. We are a military MWR (Morale, Welfare and Recreation) facility. We have a dining room, commercial kitchen, lounge, workshop and slips for approximately 50 boats. Our facility is open to the public and is enjoyed on a daily basis.

At this time, the NPS master plan calls for the removal of all individually held boat slips, removal of the breakwater wall, removal of the shore retaining wall, transformation of the workshop into a museum and the installation of a gift shoppe. In other words, the NPS envisions the complete removal of anything resembling a working marina and wants to sterilize and otherwise Velveetatize this portion of the waterfront.

I am writing to say I am against this plan. I understand that the Bay Area in general may not be the most pro-military environment. Nevertheless, Travis Marina is the last military MWR facility left on the bay. Whether or not you support the war in Iraq, the men and women stationed there and in the military in general deserve more than the loss of yet another recreational facility.

The bottom line is that we provide services: reasonably priced recreation, food, drinks, and an event location for that middle class segment of society that is not willing or not able to spend the kind of money that many 'upscale' waterfront establishments charge. There is truly nothing like our marina left in the central bay. I implore you. Please don't let this piece of history fall to the hands of the park service and the contractors who work for them. It would be a tragedy to allow this place to be the victim of bureaucratic policy. How sad for Travis Marina to be changed from a vibrant, working marina into a stagnant museum display of what 'marina life used to be,' to be viewed perhaps through a piece of plexiglass.

RENT A SKIPPER PROGRAM *By Jack Machun*

The Rent A Skipper program continues to be a success story the Presidio Yacht Club can be proud of. If providing recreational opportunities for active duty personnel is the mission of the Travis Marina/Presidio Yacht Club we can say "Mission Accomplished". Since January 2007 the Rent A Skipper program gave over 450 people a cruise on San Francisco Bay. About 400 of these cruisers were active duty military and their dependents, the rest other MWR qualified people.

The credit for this success story goes to the group of volunteer skippers who give their time to make it happen. The list of volunteers is too great to mention all, over 20 skippers participated this year. However I will mention the top three participants who are the backbone of the program. Steve Mahaley (15), Oliver Field (12) and Jason Funk (8). The others volunteered for 2 to 4 trips.



I should mention that being a Skipper is not all drudgery. There is a great deal of pleasure involved. Taking a group of novices out and showing them the fundamentals of sailing, discussing the benefits of military life and being an all around hero in command of the boat is truly rewarding.

Aside from our mission to provide recreation, the Rent A Skipper program generates a pretty good chunk of money to justify our existence. Since January 2007 the boat rentals generated over \$12,000 in rental fees. About 95% of this is by the Rent A Skipper program. The other 5% by individual renters. It's pretty obvious without the volunteer skippers the boats could not be justified.

If you are a competent sailor you can join this group. With proper credentials you can be checked out on the Catalina 30 and the Catalina 27. Contact the Marina Manager to schedule a check out ride. The check out fee is \$50. \blacklozenge

One of the nicest clubs we visited was the Lauderdale Yacht Club as seen in the above photo. Since Presidio was listed on the YCA website as a member, we not only received a prime slip next to the manicured front lawn, but also were invited to dine at their great restaurant, and had free use of their club house, tennis courts, fitness center and heated swimming pool---and to top it off, we received our first day of dockage free---saving us over \$90.

If any other members cruise in waters away from the Pacific coast, or just want to visit other yacht clubs, (and if Presidio is still a member of YCA), I encourage you to enjoy this great Presidio benefit. YCA's website says that, on request, YCA will send to Presidio individual YCA Reciprocal Courtesy Cards for use by Presidio members. They would be handy to have along, whether visiting other yacht clubs by boat or by car. Assuming that Presidio continues its membership in YCA (which I sure hope), maybe it will even be listed in future printings of the YCA "Register." ◆

Team Sandpiper Update Part V

Ahoy PYC!! September 28th was Sandpiper's two year anniversary from sailing out of Horseshoe Cove! As of our last writing we have traveled some distance from Lizard Island in Australia to where Sandpiper is currently located on a mooring buoy in front of the Royal Bali Yacht Club in Bali, Indonesia.

After departing Lizard Island Sandpiper sailed north up the Australian Coast inside the Great Barrier Reef stopping at many great anchorages along the way. We finally arrived in Darwin after sailing across the top of Australia crossing the Gulf of Carpenteria.

Sandpiper spent 3 weeks anchored in Darwin in front of the Darwin Sailing Club getting ready to leave Australia for Indonesia in the 2007 Darwin to Kupang Rally with 130 other boats from all over the world. We joined this sailing rally as the rally committee assisted us with a majority of the required paperwork for sailing thru Indonesia and scheduled stops through Indonesia with events at each stop. Sandpiper left Darwin along with all 130 boats at 11am on July 26th arriving 5 days later in Kupang Indonesia.

If you have never looked at Indonesia on a map, Indonesia is a large group of islands covering a very large area between Australia and Singapore. Kupang is on the island of Timor and is a busy city with many shops, cars including whole families on motorcycles. After being cleared in by Quarantine and Customs who came out to Sandpiper on their police boat, we went ashore where the rally committee had



Indonesian Immigration set at by the dinghy landing where we cleared in to Indonesia. During our stop in Kupang we enjoyed events scheduled by the rally committee such as a bus tour into the mountains where we visited a traditional Indonesian Village where the villagers live in grass huts and is like stepping back in time. We also attended a Gala Dinner where we were welcomed by the Governor and Mayor of Kupang and saw many different Indonesian dancers perform. After departing Kupang Sandpiper sailed overnight to the port of Alor on Flores Island where we were welcomed by the mayor of Alor and attended Alor Expo where we saw dance performances and each village on the island got to show off how they lived.



Indonesians are by far the friendliest people we have met and whenever we have gone ashore we are treated like celebrities. Most visitors to Indonesia just come to Bali and the islands surrounding Bali and very few travelers ever go to Eastern Indonesia where we have spent the last month. It is a bit overwhelming at times being surrounded by mobs of Indonesians who just want to tell you their names and to say hello, one young mother even had me autograph her son's hand! We took a dive/snorkeling trip while in Alor with many colored fish and coral. From Alor Sandpiper traveled west stopping at many remote anchorages and a few cities for rally stops. Some of our favorite stops were Rinca Island which is a World Heritage Site as the island is full of Komodo Dragons, snorkeling off Komodo Island where Sandpiper swam with turtles and giant manta rays, visiting Mount Kelimutu with is multi colored crater lakes high up in the volcanic mountains on Flores Island, Gili Air Island with its horse drawn carts and beach bars and now Bali.

Team Sandpiper's future plans are to spend the next 30 days exploring all that Indonesia has to offer, and then stop in Singapore before traveling north thru Malaysia via the Straits of Malecca, then Thailand.

Port Captain's Notes

I was here for August workday and we had a good day: Rejoined two dock sections, got some free flotation under the guest dock, installed the fire extinguishers, and set up for a nice dinner. As noted in the last *Porthole*, fingers and guest dock still need more work. We have a new method for floating docks and it is cheaper by a lot. We are using 55 gallon plastic barrels which are much cheaper than floats and have 3/4 the flotation of a tub by my calculations. We are still in the experimental stage and have placed six barrels under the Guest Dock (along with some flotation that cost us nothing since it floated in). Two of them have escaped which is evidence we don't have the method of securing them down right. However, assuming we can solve this problem, we can cheaply deal with a lot of fingers and docks. As an engineer, I worry that the drums may distort under the load, but the only way to find out is do it. Many thanks to Bob Hallin, Ernie Filippo, and Jimmy Morgan who help out constantly plus many others who help on a more occasional basis, and our energetic and decisive manager who gets what we need promptly.

A word on the fire extinguishers; we have been a long time without them and they are valuable. Consider a row of boats with gasoline and diesel engines, quantities of fuel, paint, varnish, shellac, rope, wooden docks – fire is a big hazard. DON'T USE THE FIRE EXTINGUISHER SUPPORTS FOR HOSES, CLOTHES HANGARS OR TIE UP POINTS, and try to avoid hitting them with your bow.

The electrical connections on some of the dock sections have pulled loose from their couplings. We need someone with electrical knowledge to see how these can best be re-secured.

I've been away as much as here this summer, looking forward to quiet progress in the fall. \blacklozenge
